<u>Obituary</u>

Lebester B. Cherry, Jr., was born on January 26, 1949, to the late Lebester B. Cherry, Sr. and Frances L. Cherry in Evergreen, Alabama. He was the second born child, and the only male among his siblings (Norvie, Ruby, Lecester, Gloria, and Jacqueline).

A highly active toddler, his mother affectionately nicknamed him "Peter" because he 'bounced all over the place like Peter Rabbit.' He identified with the nickname so much so that he did not know his birth name when he started school. One day, he told his mother that his teacher never called his name when she took attendance, and that there was another boy with the same last name as him who never came to class. When he became a young adult, he began using the name Pete.

Pete's family moved to Detroit, Michigan, in the 1950s. At age six, he joined Lomax Temple African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church under the late Pastor Alexander Brooks. Pete was a dutiful, faithful member of Lomax serving in Sunday School, Varick Christian Endeavor, Buds of Promise, Y-Teens Missionary Society, Sunbeam Choir, and the Wesleyan Choirs.

During his childhood, Pete enjoyed playing basketball and was a proud Boy Scout. As a teen, his sisters used to put on performances, singing and acting, for the neighbors while he focused on building the sets, setting up chairs for the audiences, and acting as their stage manager.

Pete attended Davidson Elementary School, Courville Middle School, and Pershing High School. After high school, he worked at Chrysler manufacturing plant, and in construction with his father. Pete later moved to Washington, D.C. to work for his uncle, the late Dr. John A. Cherry. He eventually decided to go into business for himself and moved to Atlanta, Georgia where he started up two companies: Cherry Sheetrock and Pro-Paper Wallpaper. Pete convinced his sister Norvie that she could use her barber skills to collaborate with him. He told her that hanging wallpaper was like cutting hair, "It's all in the cut."

Twice married, Pete was the father to two beautiful daughters. One was born in 1968 from his union with the late Sherrill D. Brantley; his second daughter was born in 1979 from his union with Lana D. Boykins.

Pete eventually returned to the Washington Metropolitan area and joined From the Heart Church Ministries (FTH). He was actively involved in the life of the church where he served in the Fine Arts Ministry. In 2004, he took a position on staff at FTH. While on staff, he used his gifts, talents and abilities as a master carpenter. In fact, his artisanship can be seen throughout the church. Further, he loved working with, and teaching the From the Heart Christian School students, as well as youth who attended FTH summer camp. He took great pride in teaching them how to build things with excellence. Pete was faithful in the work of the ministry until his health declined. He retired in November 2021 after 17 plus years of dedicated service.


On December 23, 2022, Pete Cherry ended his battle with cancer and transitioned home to be with the Lord. He will be greatly missed by all who knew and loved him.
