



Clarice J. Amado was born to the late Jake and Mary Jernigan on Saturday, August 31, 1946, in Raleigh, North Carolina. She was the sixth child of eight children.

Clarice lived in a house that her father built, literally, by himself. He died when she was a child. Clarice attended elementary and middle school in the Raleigh Public Schools until she and her mother moved to Yonkers, New York. While in New York, Clarice graduated from high school in 1964 and studied fashion design pursuing her interest in becoming a fashion designer. She eventually moved to the District of Columbia to pursue a different career. But not until after meeting her husband, Joseph Souto Amado, Jr., who she affectionately called "Do" because he was always doing something. Ultimately, the couple were married on August 12, 1978.

After moving to the District of Columbia, Clarice started her career, working as a data dictionary administrator at Amtrak. She quickly developed friendships with a group of workers known as the Crew. The Crew called her Reesie. They would often meet for lunch, especially on payday. They all would be ready to buy their lunch except for Clarice. She would say "Naw, I bring my lunch every day. You should bring your lunch and save your money."

From the union with Joseph Amado, "her pride and joy," was born, Nadine Nicole (Amado) Hungerford. Nadine married Derick, who became the cherished son she never had. Clarice affectionately only called her daughter "Nikkie." And wherever you saw Clarice, she had her Nikkie right there. Derick and Nadine gave birth to her one and only grandchild, Derick Wayne Hungerford, II, whom she loved dearly. Family was extremely important to Clarice. Even growing up, she spent her summers with her cousins in Raleigh, and often wrote lyrics and performed songs for each other. One particular song she wrote was about peanut butter. It was important to Clarice to help ensure the Medlin-Drew family reunion was held every two years. She did not miss family meetings to prepare for the reunions. She enjoyed shopping, eating, and traveling (especially cruising) with her family and friends. She was a huge Washington Redskins fan (she would not call them Commanders), until over the last few years, she decided to jump ship.

She had a special mother-daughter relationship with Nikkie, always wanting the best for her. She took pride in how she and her husband raised their daughter. She constantly imparted wisdom to her Nikkie and emphasized not doing what others were doing, and the importance of being a virtuous woman.

After retiring from Amtrak, Clarice and her "Nikkie" ended up working at the same company, Freddie Mac, for nine years. She really enjoyed the carpool rides; on the way to work, listening to Sunday Service teachings and on the way home talking about the day. In 2011, she retired from Freddie Mac and shortly thereafter joined her daughter's tax and accounting firm, as an administrator. Although Clarice loved working with her daughter, she often told her family she didn't get paid enough. And her daughter would always respond with "I pay good money."

Clarice accepted Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior at the age of 12. And later, she rededicated her life to Christ at From the Heart Church Ministries® (formerly Full Gospel). After attending service for a couple of weeks, Clarice heard there was a Full Gospel members meeting. She showed up to the members meeting with hopes of joining the church. But was informed the members meeting was for "members only." The Sunday following, June 1991, Clarice took her daughter, Nadine (Amado) Hungerford, by the hand and joined Full Gospel. She told her daughter they can now attend "members" meetings. Clarice immediately became actively involved in the church and embraced the teachings that edified and changed her life spiritually, physically, and financially. Over the years, Clarice has been a part of the Activities, Helps, Media Distribution, and Seniors Ministries. Clarice was very particular and always wanted to keep a neat and clean home and car.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Joseph Souto Amado, Jr.; father, Jake Jernigan; mother, Mary Jernigan; sisters, Mary Magaline Jernigan, and Jean Brooks; brothers: James Drew, William Drew, Joe Jernigan, and Earl Jernigan.


Today we are not only celebrating an abundant life well-lived,
