REMEMBERING BETTY

Betty Theresa Sedgwick entered peacefully into eternal rest surrounded by her immediate family at her home in Fort Washington, Maryland, on Wednesday, June 28, 2023. Betty was born on October 27, 1933, in Washington, D.C., to the late Fitzhugh and Mabel Estelle White. She was the second youngest of nine children. She had a full inspirational life of 89 years and fulfilled her God given purpose.

Betty, affectionately known as "Baby Sis", was raised in the Anacostia area of Washington, D.C., surrounded by a devoted and loving Christian family. She embraced Christ at an early age and along with her family attended Bethlehem Baptist Church. Betty was educated in the District of Columbia Public School system; she was a Dunbar Senior High School Alumnus. During her adult years, she attended Federal City College where she received her teaching assistant certification and additional college credits.

Shortly after graduating from high school in 1952, Betty married her teenage sweetheart, Lawrence H. Sedgwick, Sr. To this union three children: Lawrence Jr., Darryl, and Andrea. For the next 15 years, she was a caring shepherd watching over her flock of children, always protecting, guiding, educating, and inspiring with a great touch of motherly charm.

In 1968, Betty began her professional career as a Teacher Aide at Savoy Elementary School in District of Columbia, specializing in serving students who had learning disabilities. In 1972, she was hired as a Federal Government employee with the Department of Interior as a Management Analyst and honorably served in this agency until 1981. She advanced to another federal agency, General Services Administration (GSA) and performed as an Executive Administrative Assistant. Over the course of her employment with both agencies, she was an exemplary employee who accumulated many awards, citations, and certificates. Betty retired from the General Services Administration on January 3, 1997, with more than 25 years of dedicated federal service. Subsequently, she then returned to her lifelong passion of educating our county youth working as a Teacher Aide for 10 years in the Prince George's County Public School system at Rose Valley and Oxon Hill Elementary Schools.

Moreover, Betty always had a servant's heart and in 1986, she joined From the Heart Church Ministries. She was actively involved in the life of the church, faithfully serving in the Helps Ministry and From the Heart Christian School, until her health declined. Sister Sedgwick took great pride in serving her church and community in every way.

Another longtime interest of hers was working as a self-employed entrepreneur selling her Mary Kay cosmetic products.

In her Fort Washington community, was known as an avid gardener and an original member of the Neighborhood Watch. She possessed a generous spirit deeply rooted in stalwart confidence and purposeful commitment.

Betty was preceded in death by her sisters, Dorothy Henderson and Mabel Everett; brothers, Eugene, Fitzhugh Jr., and Stanley White; two grandsons, Lawrence H. Sedgwick, III and Darry K. Sedgwick, Jr. and great grandson, Kyree Duvall.
