# Obituary

Malikia Deborah Novalee Daniels was born on November 22, 1973, in Sacramento, California, to Kenneth and Juanita Daniels. She was the second and middle child born to this union. Malikia was christened as an infant at the family church, Century Chapel CME Church, where the foundation of her faith and values was lovingly laid.

As a young child, Malikia was gentle, creative, and observant, with a quiet spirit that drew people to her. She enjoyed spending time with family, dancing, singing, drawing, and expressing herself through art even at an early age. Her creativity and imagination were evident from childhood and remained a defining part of who she was throughout her life.

Growing up, Malikia was extremely close to her older sister Fuhara and younger brother Akili, as well as her youngest sister Camelia, born to her other mom, Joyce Garcia Daniels, and her father, Kenneth Daniels. Family meant everything to Malikia. She often participated in her Granny Daniels' fashion shows and loved being part of activities that allowed her to express her sense of style and creativity. Malikia loved art, fashion, music, and anything that allowed her to create beauty and meaning.

Malikia attended Luther Burbank High School in Sacramento before moving to Washington, DC, to live with her Aunt Deborah to complete her final two years of high school at High Point High School. While in high school, Malikia played volleyball, took art classes, and was active in several school clubs, forming friendships and memories that she cherished. After graduating, she attended Montgomery College School of Art and Design, pursuing her passion for art, before being diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis (MS) at the age of nineteen. As the disease progressed, she faced this life-altering challenge with remarkable grace and strength.

While living in Maryland, Malikia attended From the Heart Church Ministries with her Aunt Deborah and future uncle, Fred Wilds. In February 1992, she recommitted her life to Jesus Christ and joined the Church, where she was a faithful and devoted member. She enjoyed participating in the church's youth group, Youth Against Peer Pressure (YAPP), and other youth activities, finding fellowship, encouragement, and spiritual strength.

Malikia later began a relationship with Eric Smith of Fort Washington, Maryland, and in September 1995, she gave birth to their son, Eric Kenneth Smith, Jr.—the greatest joy of her life. When Eric was six months old, Malikia returned to Sacramento with her son to live with her mother, Juanita, and her grandmother, Angelina Russell. She took several art courses at Cosumnes River College while devoting most of her time, love, and energy to raising her son, whom she adored beyond measure.

Despite her life-altering illness, Malikia continued to find joy in listening to music, attending family gatherings, reminiscing over old photographs, laughing with loved ones, and cherishing quiet moments with those closest to her. As her MS progressed, she was able to do less physically, but her spirit remained strong. She never became despondent or resentful. Instead, she faced each day with humility, gratitude, and faith. Her beautiful smile, gentle demeanor, and deep appreciation for the care and love shown to her touched everyone who knew her. Malikia's life was a testament to perseverance, faith, creativity, and unconditional love.

She is survived by her beloved son, Eric Kenneth Smith, Jr.; her mother, Juanita Daniels; sisters, Fuhara Gaskins (David) and Camelia Daniels; brother, Akili Daniels (Kashani); second mother, Joyce Garcia Daniels; aunt, Deborah Wilds (Fred); uncles, Oliver Daniels, Frederick Daniels, and David Russell; nephews, Akili Daniels, Jr. and Kenneth Irvin; niece, Justyce Gaskins; great nephew, Jaziah Brown; and a host of cousins, other relatives, and dear friends who will forever cherish her memory.
